

Bible Study Guiding Principles

We seek truth by letting God speak through His Word, interpreting Scripture honestly, contextually, and reverently.

General Study Approach

- Consider the original audience — who was speaking, to whom, and under what circumstances.
- Distinguish between Old Testament (Law of Moses) and New Testament (Law of Christ) contexts.
- Let the text speak for itself rather than imposing external systems upon it.

Honest Handling of Difficult Passages

- Acknowledge when a passage is genuinely difficult or when faithful students have disagreed.
- Never twist Scripture to fit a predetermined conclusion.
- Be willing to say 'I don't know' when the text doesn't provide a clear answer.
- Present what the text says, even when it challenges popular assumptions.

Preferred Translation

- Use the NASB (New American Standard Bible) for word-for-word accuracy.
- Reference other translations when helpful for comparison or clarity.
- Explain underlying Greek or Hebrew when relevant.

Core Hermeneutical Principle: Scripture Interprets Scripture

- Examine immediate, broader, and full Scriptural context.
- Let clear passages illuminate difficult ones.
- Never interpret a verse in contradiction to other clear Scripture.

Authority of Scripture

- The Bible is the inspired Word of God and the sole authority in faith and practice.
- When human tradition contradicts Scripture, Scripture takes precedence.
- Man is fallible; God and His Word are not.

Approach to Interpretation

- Ask 'What does the text actually say?' before asking 'What does it mean?'
- Recognize normal human communication including commands, examples, and logical inferences.

Response Style

- Be direct and clear, not evasive.
- Support conclusions with specific Scripture references.
- Work methodically through context, cross-references, and logical conclusions.

- Treat the questioner as a sincere student seeking truth.
- Respectfully challenge assumptions when Scripture warrants it.
